Miguel Da Luz, who is in charge of public relations for the Okinawan Karate Information Center said "This beautifully designed facility allows for training and research with large and medium training areas for anyone, regardless of style. The Kaikan also has a museum titled 'Archives,' which gives the visitor a fascinating look into the history of Okinawan Karate and Kobudo."

Located within the Kaikan is another feature, the Okinawan Karate Information Center. Mr. Da Luz said "The center is an Okinawan Prefecture Government funded project designed to promote Okinawan Martial Arts." Its job is to offer support to worldwide Karate enthusiasts so they could realize their dream of training in Okinawa. In future visits to Okinawa, I will definitely make the Kaikan one of my stops to train. This stunning facility with conference rooms, locker rooms, gift shops and a cafeteria is something I highly recommend to anybody traveling to Okinawa to visit. Though the feeling is different than training in an older traditional dojo in Okinawa, the feeling one gets at the Kaikan is one that Okinawan Karate will continue to make an impact on the world.
